

### Puppy Vaccination Schedule

The first thing to know is that there is not just one puppy vaccination schedule for all dogs. Factors such as which part of the country you live in, and your dog's individual risk factors will come into play. Some dogs do not need every vaccine. This decision is between you and your veterinarian. Always discuss puppy vaccinations at your regularly scheduled appointments.

That said, here is a generally accepted guideline of the puppy vaccination schedule for the first year.




Puppy's Age	Mandatory CORE Vaccinations	Optional Vaccinations (per lifestyle and recommendations of veterinari
6 — 8 weeks	Initial Distemper, PARVO Vaccine	Bordetella
10 — 12 weeks	DHPP (vaccines for distemper, adenovirus [hepatitis], parainfluenza, and parvovirus)	Consider starting INFLUENZA per lifestyle (First of 2)  Consider starting Leptospirosis, Bordetella, Lyme disease per lifestyle as recommended by veterinarian (First of 2)
16 — 18 weeks	DHPP (#2 booster if given 3-4 weeks previously)  FIRST RABIES VACCINE (REQUIRED BY LAW)  NOTE: Now recommend last puppy booster be administered between 16-20 weeks of age: discuss with veterinarian	OPTIONAL PER LIFESTYLE AS DISCUSSION WITH VET:  Lyme disease, Leptospirosis, Bordetella per lifestyle as recommended by veterinarian (2nd booster of 2)  INFLUENZA BOOSTER (2nd of 2)

Many common household items that you use every day can be harmful, and sometimes even lethal to your dog. Always keep garbage and medication out of reach of your pets, children, and animals.

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# Welcoming Your New Puppy Home: Do's, Don'ts, and What to Expect

Congratulations on the newest addition to your family! The day you bring your new puppy home is a day you've both been waiting for. You want to make sure the first day is the best it can be for your puppy, you, and your family.

Use this guide to make sure the lifelong bond with your dog starts on "the right paw."

### Your Puppy's First Day Checklist:

- ☐ Complete your puppy's AKC Registration at akc.org/register.
- Try not to overwhelm your puppy. Introduce him to your home, one room at a time.
- ☐ Choose a potty spot and choose a command. When he does go, make sure to reward him with treats and praise.
- Introduce him to house rules and his new family members (including other pets), one member at a time.
- ☐ Minimize the stress and excitement from other visitors. Your friends will be able to meet him very soon—just not today.
- ☐ Schedule his first vet visit (Use our Puppy Vaccination Schedule and Medical tracker). Because your puppy hasn't gotten all his shots, don't interact with dogs outside your home!
- Regular coat and nail care is important! Don't wait to get your puppy accustomed to the groomer. Visit marketplace.akc.org/search-groomers to find a salon near you.
- ☐ Sign up for AKC Pupdate at akc.org/pupdate to get weekly emails with personalized advice for your puppy's breed and age.
- ☐ Make sure you have all the supplies you need to make your puppy feel right at home. Visit akc.org/shop and get 15% off your first order by using the code AKCDOG15.

### Start a Routine (and Stick to It!)

Structure will help your puppy feel secure and help him understand what's expected of him. Routine makes it easier for everyone, pet owners included.

 Meals: Young puppies eat three times a day. Put your puppy on a regular feeding schedule and make sure there is always water nearby.



- Potty: Most puppies have to use the bathroom at least every 45 minutes when they're awake. Make sure to bring him to the designated potty area.
- 3. Play: Puppies need exercise and mental stimulation, too! Some exercises like long runs and jumping are not good for puppies; instead, playing with toys and running in the yard are great ways to exercise and bond with your puppy.
- 4. Sleep: Young puppies sleep a lot—some up to 16 to 18 hours a day! Plan on several naps throughout the day and set a bedtime. To reduce the anxiety that the first night can cause your puppy, put his crate in your bedroom. Your pup will feel safe knowing you're nearby.
